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Have fun with your serger.

Remember, you can thread the loopers by cutting the threads as long as you can and as far as you can from the pole - I unwind a bit extra from each spool before cutting - then using an overhand knot tie on the new thread. Pull the thread through from under the presser foot (remember to raise the presser foot to release the discs) until the new

thread comes through. Does't work for the needle threads, because the knot won't go through the eye of the needle. Just thread them fresh.

Each time you try something new - make a sample! and label it! so you have a reference for how it should look.
